

A Look at the Massachusetts Industries That Are Most Vulnerable due to COVID-19

Unemployment in Massachusetts

On March 17, the Brookings Institute cited a “quite dire” research note from Mark Zandi, chief economist at Moody’s Analytics, [identifying the leisure and hospitality industry as the sector most vulnerable to disruption](#) by demand declines, shutdowns, and layoffs related to the coronavirus pandemic.

On March 18, the leading U.S. labor union for hospitality workers said that it expects [80% to 90% of its 300,000 members to be out of work](#) due to the outbreak.

In addition, Massachusetts saw a record number of job-holders file for unemployment insurance in the [final two weeks in March 2020](#), continued in the [first two weeks of April](#). During this period, over 500,000 people submitted claims. The following chart displays the number of claims by sector, which reveals how each sector in Massachusetts may be vulnerable and impacted due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

If the two observers mentioned earlier are correct, many Massachusetts cities and towns may be facing a severe threat. Data from Pioneer Institute’s [MassEconomix web portal](#) details each sector’s employment by Massachusetts municipality in 2018.



Analysis of Vulnerable Sectors

According to the data from MassEconomix.org, jobs in the hospitality “super sector” — which represents accommodation and food services, as well as arts, entertainment and recreation — make up significant proportions of the total job count in municipalities across the state, but the highest proportions of hospitality jobs fall in Western Massachusetts and in Cape Cod and the Islands.

Chart 1: Hospitality Jobs as Percent of Total Jobs by Municipality (2018).



The map and the data found below indicate that while the total number of jobs in hospitality varies across the state, municipalities grouped by workforce development areas (WDAs) in Western Massachusetts as well as Cape Cod see high proportions of their workforce in this sector, which is already impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, and may see lasting economic effects in the summer of 2020, a peak tourism season for these areas, and beyond. The table below displays the ten municipalities in Massachusetts with the highest densities of hospitality sector jobs that are performed within the bounds of each municipality. For example, 75 percent of the jobs performed in Hancock, MA are in the hospitality super sector. If the COVID-19 pandemic severely

impacts travel, tourism, and accommodations industries, the local economy in Hancock will be seriously crippled, and the bulk of employees in this town may be vulnerable to layoffs, pay reductions, and business closures. With the exception of the town of Princeton, seven of these top ten municipalities are found in Western Massachusetts, and two are in Cape Cod and surrounding islands.



Retail was identified as a potentially highly vulnerable sector due to shutdowns related to the COVID-19 pandemic, but in March did not at first experience the same levels of unemployment claims as Hospitality, Health Care and Social Assistance, and Construction. However, based on the latest data released April 16, Retail Trade now has the second highest number of claims in Massachusetts. The following map displays the employment situation by municipality as it relates to the Retail Sector, which is identified as being vulnerable to economic impacts from the COVID-19 pandemic. When looking at Retail, the municipalities with the highest proportions of Retail jobs in their economies are more spread out across the state of Massachusetts. Alford, MA has the highest percentage in Retail, with 77 percent of total jobs in the town attributed to Retail industries.

Chart 2: Retail Jobs as a Percentage of Total Jobs by Municipality (2018).



The following table shows municipality-level data for the ten municipalities with the highest percentage of workers in the Retail super sector as compared with total jobs in each city or town. While these municipalities are not necessarily grouped by geographic region, there are some patterns related to the types of communities they fall

under. According to the Metropolitan Area Planning Council (MAPC) designations labelled “community sub-types” (CSTs), eight out of ten fall under the categories with lower populations and slower town growth (Rural Towns, Country Suburbs, and Maturing New England Towns). The remaining two, Framingham and Saugus, have slightly higher population density and are mostly built out, but not enough to be considered more “urban” or “core”. These ten municipalities range from 30 to 77 percent of their total jobs attributed to the Retail industry, which has been identified as being vulnerable to suffering negative impacts due to the COVID-19 pandemic. These numbers represent relatively high numbers of workers being potentially subject to lack of work.



The Health Care and Social Assistance sector has experienced the third-highest number of unemployment claims since March. The following map shows the municipalities that have the largest densities of Health Care and Social Assistance workers as a proportion of total jobs in each local economy. The municipality with the highest percentage of Health Care and Social Assistance jobs in 2018 was Sandisfield, MA, followed closely by Melrose and Brookline.

Chart 3: Health Care & Social Assistance Jobs as Percent of Total Jobs by Municipality (2018).



While Boston is normally considered a powerhouse of the health care industry, the number of Health Care and Social Assistance jobs only made up about 20 percent of total jobs in Boston in 2018. For cities and municipalities with a diverse industrial makeup, unemployment impacts in the health care and related industries on these local economies may be lessened. However, for cities and towns with larger shares of total jobs dedicated to the Health Care and Social Assistance sector, like Sandisfield, Melrose, Brookline, and Salem whose local economies are dependent on this sector for nearly half of their local jobs, the impact of unemployment due to COVID-19 may be more crippling. The following table displays the top ten municipalities that

experienced the highest proportions of jobs in Health Care and Social Assistance in 2018. This list features some communities that are more rural, some more established suburbs, and also more urban communities.



The fourth largest sector in March unemployment claims was Construction. While select jobs under Construction may be considered essential, many municipalities [have halted a significant amount of construction projects](#) due to social distancing guidelines. The next map shows the proportion of local economies that were made up by jobs in the Construction sector in 2018. The municipality that may be most heavily impacted by slowdowns in this sector is Acushnet, MA, with 22 percent of total jobs dedicated to Construction in 2018.

Chart 4: Construction Jobs as Percent of Total Jobs by Municipality (2018).



Acushnet is followed by Richmond, Sunderland, and Freetown, all with nearly 20 percent of total local jobs in Construction. The following table represents the towns with the highest densities of Construction jobs as of 2018. These municipalities fall in the more rural categories of Community Sub-types, and there is no representation in the top ten list by communities in the more urban part of the state.

While many areas and industries will be affected by slowing and stoppage of normal business activity due to the COVID-19 crisis, there are some industries that will be directly affected more than others. Municipalities with high densities of jobs in seriously vulnerable industries, like those in Hospitality and Retail, may face upwards of one-third of their employees being subject to loss of income and unemployment. For some, it could be as high as three-quarters of the jobs in that town that are affected.
